Academic Societies

ACT (Aspiring Creatives in Theatre)

Don't be fooled by the name - this club is everything BUT acting! A brand-new Friday lunch time club, open to all. We will explore technical & design roles, hear from visiting speakers working in the Performing Arts Industry and watch live theatre together.

Ancestry Society

This brand new, student-founded society will enable students to reflect on the importance of ancestry in self-understanding, as well as providing tools to conduct personal research into your own family history.

Café Philo

Café Philo is a student-led discussion group. Each session focuses on a topic of interest related to philosophy, politics, ethics and current affairs.

Creative Writing

Investigating Science (KS4)

A club for the scientifically inquisitive in KS4. Come along if you want to start building a profile of scientific knowledge beyond the GCSE syllabus.

IRIS Genome Project Decoders

Open to Sixth Form biologists interested in extending their knowledge of genome sequences and how genes can be identified from unannotated genomic data. This is a novel research project run in collaboration with the Institute for Research in Schools and the Wellcome Sanger Institute.

Inspire Research Club

These sessions are open to all intellectually ambitious students in Years 7, 8 and 9 who want to have their thinking extended. We look at how to develop a personal profile of research interests, and teach research skills that will be useful for essay competitions and research components later on in school.

Junior Mathematical Challenge

Members of Years 7 and 8 are presented with problems that will stretch and challenge them in preparation for the Junior Maths challenge in the summer.

KS3 Science Club

Calling all young scientists. If you are ambitious about learning more about science and extending your knowledge beyond the classroom, this is the society for you.

Landor Journalism Club

Simon was a 21 year old soldier in the Welsh Guards and suffered terrible burns when HMS Sir Galahad was set on fire by Argentine missiles during the Falklands War. Simon will be talking about the war 40 years on and how he remade his life following his lifechanging injuries.

A Café Philo discussion by Dr Tim Middleton who works in the theology and religion faculty at the University of Oxford. Dr Middleton first trained as a scientist, completing a DPhil (2016) in Earth Sciences at the University of Oxford. He will be discussing Christianity and religion in relation to the modern day world and the very prominent topic of our world and ecosystems.

SIR ANTHONY SELDON: THREE HUNDRED YEARS OF PRIME MINISTERS King's High Hall, 16.15pm

Sir Anthony Seldon is the author of numerous books on British Prime Ministers and UK government. One of the most influential Headteachers of recent years, Sir Anthony also served as Vice-Chancellor of Buckingham University. He has recently completed a 1,000KM pilgrimage along the western front.
