
King's High has also been named a *Tatler School 2025*, a prestigious accolade that celebrates outstanding achievements in education.


READING FOR PLEASURE

KING'S INSPIRES



'It is a great pleasure to collate Inspire Essay Competition entries from both 2023 and 2024 into a bumper edition, showcasing the range of interests, depth of research, and passion for ideas that our prize-winners have displayed in such abundance.

As ever, pupils in Key Stage 3 were asked simply to choose a topic that interested them, investigate it independently, and write up their findings in essay form. The essays

printed in these pages represent fewer than a third of those that were submitted. They were chosen for the quality of research, depth of analysis, standard of essay composition and originality of ideas. It is always interesting to see which themes emerge from our pupils' work when we give them free choice of topic.

'To my mind, four key umbrella ideas can be found this time round. Ethics and social responsibility feature prominently, with searching analysis around sponsorship, historic injustice, the role of history itself, the prison system, belief and systems of morality. Technology and Science also takes its place, with essays on medicine, Al, cryptography, electric cars, physics and biology. Our pupils also make clear their interest in the role and nature of education, with pieces on future curricula, the role of music, and the timing of the school day. And then there are the big, more miscellaneous topics that always take the judging panel by surprise: success, love, conformity, coincidence... Who could ask for more from an optional essay competition for Key Stage 3?

THE EGG DROP

Our Key Stage 3 students showcased their egg-straordinary creativity and design prowess in *The Egg Drop Challenge*. While some designs scrambled under pressure and others emerged unscathed, everyone had a cracking good time embracing the activity!

Business Language Champions aims to

promote Modern Foreign Languages and cultural cohesion by demonstrating to young students the importance of language skills in the workplace. The event brought together six different schools and international business people to inspire more young students to continue with their language learning through to further education and then beyond into language related careers.

Ten teams, made up of students from different schools worked together throughout the day to complete a series of challenges based around marketing and selling a new product in a foreign language. It was impressive to see excellent communication skills, entrepreneurial flair and collaboration throughout the day. Students used their language skills to promote and market their new product and it was great to see how much fun everyone had together, putting their language skills to the test. We were delighted that Claudia was recognised and awarded a prize by the Business Language Champions for her Leadership Skills throughout the day.

CULTURAL DAY



A group of our Year 8 Modern Foreign Languages students took part in a European cultural day in London alongside 100 students from UK schools. Their visit began with workshops at the Goethe-Institut in South Kensington, where they explored German graffiti's cultural significance, particularly the Berlin Wall, and debated whether graffiti is art or vandalism. In another session, they examined French comic strips, a hallmark of francophone culture, and created French-language dialogue for illustrations.

After lunch, the group moved to the Institut Français to watch two animated short films, one in German and one in French. The day was an enriching blend of creative and linguistic exploration, offering students the chance to enhance their language skills whilst having fun!

I am enjoying the opportunities the experience has already brought including singing Christmas music for the BBC Daily Service at the BBC Philharmonic Studio, to be broadcast across Christmas week on BBC Radio 4Extra, and recording the Songs of Praise Candlelit Christmas, to be televised on 22 December. I hope there will be more next year!"

We could not be more proud of Anna in Year 8, who has been crowned the winner of the BBC Songs of Praise Young Chorister of the Year competition.

Anna, of the Choir of St Mary's, sang her way to the final of this prestigious national competition, which was televised on Sunday, 1 December. Adam Albrighton, Director of Music, described Anna's performance as "an incredible achievement – showcasing such stunning musicianship, composure, and maturity. We are very proud of Anna for all she has achieved so far and are excited to see where her musicianship leads her next!"

Anna shared her experience: "I have watched the Young Chorister competition for the last few years and always wanted to enter one day. This year, the competition was announced in the Spring, and entries were invited. I had to complete a short online form and send in a recording of two pieces – both music I might sing in church: one a congregational item and one a Christmas song. I sang the hymn 'I Heard the Voice of Jesus Say' and Michael Head's 'Star Candles'







"A few weeks later, the BBC called my mum to tell her I had been chosen as one of five semi-finalists. I was so excited! Everyone was asked to change one of their audition pieces, but we could choose two new ones if we wished. I selected 'I Heard the Voice of Jesus Say' and 'The Virgin's Lullaby' by Max Reger. The BBC also requested photographs and information about my singing journey, including where and when I started, who has supported me, and how singing makes me feel.

"We spent three days in Manchester filming. The first day included a mentoring session with Aled Jones and interviews with Reverend Kate Bottley. The second day was the semi-final, and the final took place on the third day. All the semi-finalists took part in the final as there was a joint song with all the contestants. The judges – Katherine Jenkins, Bob Chilcott, and YolanDa Brown – were so knowledgeable, and we had the chance to meet them all. They gave advice to all the competitors on technique and musicality, and the entire team made sure we felt comfortable and relaxed.

"It was fascinating to see how a television programme is made.

Everyone involved was so kind. One of the best parts of the
competition was meeting the other choristers and forming friendships

– we're still in touch. It was a wonderful experience, and I was very
sad when it ended. If I could, I would do it all again tomorrow!"

Anna joined the Choir of St Mary's in January 2019. As a chorister, she participates in regular rehearsals and services, singing Evensong on Wednesdays with the girl choristers and Sunday services throughout the year. She has also taken part in exciting events, including live broadcasts of Choral Evensong on BBC Radio 3, performing for 3,000 people in Warwick at Carols at the Castle, CD recordings, choir tours across the UK – including to Canterbury Cathedral and Westminster Abbey – and further afield to Normandy.

Dr Burley, Head Master, commented: "What a very special achievement! Such talent, poise, and assurance." He added, "Very well done to all the talented young singers in the final. It was a real joy to watch such incredible performances, and of course, to see Anna's well-deserved success."

Anna also recently starred as Wednesday in our Junior Production of the *Addams Family*, and is part of our Music Scholars' group, Accordia, who were the Under 12 national champions in this year's Pro Corda finals – another outstanding achievement.




including the Oxford Gun Club Competition, the Millfield Invitational, and the Rugby Competition.



During the October half term, the Warwick School Foundation's Combined Cadet Force (CCF) conducted a challenging weekend exercise at the Leek Military Training Area, with both girls and boys participating. The exercise tested cadets' resilience as they navigated harsh weather conditions and a rigorous schedule of activities, including patrolling, night ambushes, navigation, reconnaissance missions, and section attacks. The undulating terrain and demanding scenarios pushed the cadets to their limits, but their determination and teamwork shone through as they persevered to the very end. This was a true test of grit and commitment, and the students performed admirably.

CADETS SOAR AT RAF COSFORD

On Sunday, 17 November, students from the Warwick Schools Foundation Combined Cadet Force (CCF) proudly represented their unit at the annual RAF Air Squadron Trophy (RAST) competition held at RAF Cosford.

The cadets took part in a variety of challenging activities designed to test their skills, discipline, and teamwork. Events included precision drill routines, aircraft recognition, first aid demonstrations, and air rifle shooting.

The CCF at King's High is a voluntary Friday Afternoon Activity open to students in Year 9 and above. The overriding aim of training in the CCF is to develop skills in leadership, teamwork, initiative and self-reliance, which encourages confidence and independence. The RAF section offers the chance to get air experience, flying in both gliders and powered aircraft, which can lead to cadets gaining their own pilot's licence. The RAF Section also offers the opportunity of a week's summer camp at an RAF Station, where they have further flying training, leadership and team-building activities and guided visits to squadrons on the host station.



KING'S SCIENCE

THE SKY'S THE LIMIT



In what we hope will become an annual tradition, King's High is once again entering the UK Youth Rocketry Challenge. A daring team of five Sixth Form students (Sana, Emily, Ana, Dheepthi, and team leader Izzy) has already begun planning and testing components of their rocket under the name Space Eggs. Their 'Eggs Broken' count

is currently at a disappointing two, but they expect to reach double digits by the end of the term. The team extends their heartfelt thanks to the King's High chickens for their continued support!

This year's UKROC rules are especially challenging: the Space Eggs' rocket must carry a payload of two eggs (rather than one, as in previous years) to a dizzying altitude of 790 feet and split into two sections, each requiring a parachute. To achieve a perfect score, their payload section must land between 41 and 44 seconds after liftoff, with both eggs still intact.

Look out for updates throughout the year as Space Eggs aim for the regional and national finals – and, with luck, the international competition at the Paris Air Show!

This term, King's Rocket Club, under the expert leadership of George Tarver, had the privilege of hosting Paul Carter from the Midland Rocketry Society. Known for his hands-on approach, Paul's sessions are always a highlight, inspiring budding rocketeers with his expertise and passion.

Paul began the session by giving students a fascinating insight into rocket design, focusing on the critical principles of stability in flight.

EXPLOSIVE SCIENCE

Year 7 students had the most wonderful time on their annual Science trip to Warwick University's Christmas Lectures. The Warwick campus, beautifully lit with festive lights, set the perfect scene for an inspiring and entertaining evening.



Held at the Warwick Arts Centre, which provided a spectacular venue for these talks, the lectures covered exciting topics such as the science behind 'keepy-uppy' and a live volcano eruption! Students also participated in a fascinating maths session, estimating how many presents could fit in the hall – answer: enough to delight all the children in Coventry and Warwickshire! The fun concluded with a lively sing-along coach journey back to school. It was an unforgettable night of learning and laughter for all involved.

The excitement reached new heights as the group headed out to the launch pad. After witnessing Paul's air-launch system in action last year indoors, this time the rockets soared under full power. The results were spectacular – rockets flew the length of the Quad, and two even disappeared over the building, never to be seen again!

King's Physics Teacher Dr Wheatley's rocket was a standout performer, earning comparisons to Space X for its flawless flight. It was a day of inspiration, innovation, and soaring success for the King's Rocket Club!



BIOLOGY WEEK

Biology Week, celebrated from 7-11 October, was packed with engaging activities and opportunities to explore the wonders of the natural world. At King's, we embraced the week with a Nature Photography competition and a lively Biology Scavenger Hunt for Year 8 students, both of which captured the spirit of curiosity and discovery.

A highlight of the week was a series of fascinating online talks hosted by the Royal Society of Biology, featuring leading experts who delved into some of the most exciting topics in modern biology:

Dr Chris Thorogood, Head of Science at the University of Oxford Botanic Garden, shared his thrilling adventures and groundbreaking conservation efforts studying Rafflesia, the plant that produces the world's largest flowers.

Professor Lindsay Turnbull, a renowned plant ecologist at the University of Oxford, explained why plants are the ultimate traders on Earth. She discussed how they 'stole' photosynthesis – arguably the most significant innovation in history – and formed essential partnerships that sustain all life.

A myth-busting session addressed common misconceptions in biology, challenging participants to think critically about what they know.

Professor Tim Coulson, Professor of Zoology at the University of Oxford, took us on an awe-inspiring journey back to the Big Bang. Spanning 13.8 billion years, his talk culminated in the most astonishing phenomenon of all — the staggering complexity of the human mind. Truly, the greatest story ever told.

It was a fantastic week filled with biological fun and inspiration!



BIOLOGY IN ACTION

No less than 40 A Level students attended the annual *Biology in Action* lectures at Warwick University in November. The students thoroughly enjoyed listening to experts who talked with great passion about their research. Topics included the search for extraterrestrial life, the causes and development of Alzheimer's and the biology behind bringing extinct species back to life. These lectures gave plenty of food for thought and prompted lots of conversations over lunch about the relative merits of saving the Northern White Rhino and whether life will ever be found on Mars! It was an engaging and thought-provoking day, providing students with fascinating insights into biology in real-world contexts.

PHYSICS IN FOCUS

Lower Sixth physicists had the exciting opportunity to visit Warwick University in November, where they attended a series of fascinating lectures exploring a wide array of physics topics. From quantum photonics and using nuclear energy to power spacecraft, to the Coriolis effect on Earth and the surprising uses of ultrasound (beyond its role in baby scans!), the day was packed with thought-provoking discussions. The experience offered our students a valuable insight into university life and showcased the diverse career paths available in the field of physics.

CAFÉ SCIENTIFIQUE



This term, we welcomed a dynamic new leadership team for Café Scientifique following a series of interviews. Congratulations to Isabelle, Shraddhaa, Sahana, Cherrie, Karine, Eleanor, Deepthi, and Emma on being selected! Bursting with ideas and enthusiasm, the team has already made a stellar start.

Their chosen theme for the first half term, 'Life and Death', inspired a fantastic first edition of the Café Scientifique newsletter, published in October. The team also delighted younger students by hosting a hugely popular Halloween 'Spooky Slime' workshop for Key Stage 3 — so popular, in fact, that supplies of glue nearly ran out!

Looking ahead, the second newsletter, will explore the fascinating theme of 'Defiance in Science', celebrating individuals and events that challenged expectations in the scientific world.

In a special assembly for Warwick Prep Year 5 and 6 students, the team shared their mission for the year: to inspire and engage everyone in science. With such a strong start, they are well on their way to achieving that goal. Here's to a fantastic year ahead for Café Scientifique!

JUNIOR ASTRO CHALLENGE

In November, nine enthusiastic students from Year 10 voluntarily took on the Junior Astro Challenge – a quiz which blends Physics-based problems with the wonders of Astronomy. This challenge required creativity, determination, and analytical thinking to tackle some particularly tricky questions.

We are thrilled to announce that all our students earned medals for their efforts, with four achieving bronze awards and five taking home silver.

KING'S MUSIC

It has been another exciting and action-packed term for Music at King's High. We are hugely proud of the musical achievements of all our students, in concerts and ensembles as well as individual successes.

The first major concert each year is the Year 7 concert, held just before half term. 



KING'S DRAMA

It has been a wonderful start to the year for Drama at King's High.

Rehearsals for our Senior Production of Sondheim's masterpiece *Sweeney Todd* started straight away. In November, Pupils across King's High and Warwick School performed in the cast; created the grisly stage magic backstage and played alongside professional musicians in the orchestra. The ambitious production was full of surprises, from an enormous orchestra concealed in shadows within the set; an enormous chute for Sweeney's victims to slide down and some fabulous blood effects created by horror industry expert Paul Wilkins. The production was a resounding sell-out success, finishing off with a well-deserved standing ovation on Saturday night.

Trips have been another highlight, with many exciting opportunities on offer for our students. This term, Key Stage 3 students enjoyed a wonderful performance of Twelfth Night at the RSC with the English Department. Year 10 and Year 11 GCSE Drama students spent the day in Bath, watching an exhilarating performance of 1984. They had the opportunity to ask experienced actor Keith Allen plenty of questions about the acting and design process at the end of the show. It has been an action-packed term for professional industry workshops at A Level: two highlights have been a fascinating visit from Beth Fiducia-Brookes, Artistic Director of Underground Lights, and an opportunity to participate in a professional performance of set text Woyzeck with KatMary. A Level Drama students also enjoyed fantastic performances of Dracula by Blackeyed Theatre and Othello at the RSC, supporting both their Drama and English A Level courses. Over half term, the Friday Afternoon Activity Improvisation Troupe attended the acclaimed tour of Showstopper: The Improvised Musical at the Warwick Arts Centre.

Our GCSE and Upper Sixth students both performed their original devised pieces to public audiences this term, with their subject matter exploring everything from Agatha Christie's mysterious disappearance to espionage in the Second World War. We are very proud of their final pieces.

It has also been a wonderful term for the LAMDA department. Our fantastic team of LAMDA teachers have welcomed many new students alongside continuing to support our existing ones. Preparation is well underway for the new series of examinations and our showcase evening next term, both of which promise to celebrate the wide range of styles, genres and writers our students have been exploring in depth.

Meanwhile, Drama clubs have been in full flow. In an exciting addition to our current extensive provision, we have launched a brand-new collaboration with Modern Foreign Languages: 'Performing in Other Languages'. This term, students have been looking at a multilingual version of Art by Yasmina Reza, exploring the text in French, Spanish and English. Meanwhile, Aspiring Creatives in Theatre Club have been put to work on the pie production line for Sweeney Todd; visited the Sweeney Todd set and investigated how it was designed; created their own Beetlejuice-inspired make-up designs and learnt all about the role of a dramaturg.

Arts Careers week. Students attended a vast range of talks from professional performer Lucy Chamberlain, LAMDA Chief Executive Linda Macrow, Artistic Director of Arts Insight Laura Berridge and professional games designer Richard Tawn exploring the application of cinematography in the video games industry. Students in Lower Sixth attended a fascinating workshop in applied community theatre with Beth Fiducia-Brookes, learning all about her work with poor mental health, SEMH and SEND needs and people in prison. Our professional headshot session was very popular, with students from Year 11 to Upper Sixth taking advantage of this opportunity. Meanwhile, our weekly Dramatic Arts Careers Club have been working on their own individual careers-focused projects. As we neared the end of term, our thoughts turned to upcoming

productions. Students from Year 9 and 10 have begun rehearsals for the Middle School Production of Faustus in collaboration with Warwick School. After weeks of refusing to give the game away, the Drama Department team finally revealed (in full costume, of course) the title of our production: There's No Place Like Home! Inspired by the Wizard of Oz, this exciting prequel asks if there is more to the story... why was Dorothy really brought to Oz? This fabulous production promises to showcase a wide range of lower school talent alongside some original music composed by our own students at King's High.



KING'S SPORT

As we bring the Autumn term to a close, it has been a pleasure to reflect on the many sporting fixtures and opportunities our students have embraced this academic year.

The term began with an exciting start – just two days in, seven teams and over 100 pupils participated in competitive hockey fixtures against Bedford Girls' School.

It has been a mixed hockey season with the 1st XI facing tough challenges playing in the top league in the country. They have shown great resilience and team spirit and have been justly rewarded with a strong win in their most recent fixture against King's Taunton. Other notable matches for the team came with a victory after penalty shuffles in an ISHC cup game against Trent College and a recent 4-1 win over Loughborough in a friendly.

The 2nd XI have enjoyed victories over Bedford Girls' School and King's Worcester in their friendly matches and, playing against other schools' A teams in their cup run, managed to put on a strong performance.

The strength of depth in hockey at King's currently is impressive with the U16 team's highlight of a thrilling 3-2 win, having been 2-0 down at half time, and the U15 team currently undefeated after coming through two penalty stroke competitions in the round of their ISHC cup run.

Our Junior teams enjoyed a fantastic tour of Holland over the half term break with 40 pupils from Year 9 and Year 8 experiencing a professional hockey match, training sessions and many matches over the course of the five-day experience. Undoubtedly, their hockey progressed as a result of the tour. The U13A team have recorded an emphatic 6-0 win in their latest cup match and the U14B team competed strongly against other schools' A teams in the county tournament.

The U12 teams are proving to be a force to be reckoned with in the region. The A team have won all of their games so far without conceding a goal! There have been highlights for the U12E team with a thrilling 5-5 match played against Bromsgrove and a similar experience for the G team with a 3-3 result against King Henry VIII School's U12C team. We look forward to their continued progress as a year group next term.

The indoor hockey season is a brief but action-packed experience. The U16 and U18 teams enjoyed warm up matches against Rugby, recording a combined 4-1 win. This was great preparation for the Regional Qualifiers. The U16 team were superb in theirs with some students playing their first competitive tournament in this format of the game. They justly qualified for the Regional Finals where they acquitted themselves well, despite the slow start. The U18 team played some slick indoor hockey in their Midlands qualifier but it wasn't quite enough this year to see them through to finals day.

Alongside the hockey this term, there have, of course, been many other fixtures across a range of different sports. The netball season is already in full flow with all teams playing in their various cup competitions and tournaments. It's been an exciting start!

The U12 teams have been particularly impressive, with the U12B team winning their first 'Sister n Sport' match 18-12 against Bablake. The U12A team also made a strong start to the season, with their skill and speed helping them dominate their first match of the competition.

The U13 teams had a successful run in the 'Sister n Sport' Shield, with the U13B team defeating King Henry VIII 32-6 in their opening round. The U13A team also triumphed, overcoming tough opposition to win 38-26, demonstrating excellent teamwork and skill. The U14s also impressed in their 'Sister n Sport' matches, with the U14B team showing great defensive and attacking play to secure a fantastic win. The U14s also managed to win their county tournament this term and followed this up with an impressive County Triangular tournament to secure a spot at the Regional Finals next term.

The U15A team had a challenging start to their 'Sister n Sport' competition but bounced back strongly, securing a hard-fought victory over Bablake. The U15B team demonstrated their resilience with a close win against King's School Worcester, securing a 17-15 victory thanks to crucial turnovers in the final quarter. The U16 teams also had strong performances, with the U16B team impressing with their teamwork and defensive skills.

In the senior teams, over 100 pupils have attended training and enjoyed many matches. They weren't quite able to make it to the Regional Finals with the U14s but the 1st VII did enjoy a fantastic match against Stratford Girls Grammar, edging the result 33-32!

There have been solid Starts in the ESFA Cup for our football teams. The U12 team won their first match 4-0 against Bishop Ullathorne, after an early goalless first half. The team showed great teamwork and possession, paving the way for a successful season ahead.

The U15 team also made a solid start in the ESFA Cup, defeating North Bromsgrove 3-1 in challenging conditions. Despite heavy rain, King's High's players maintained their composure, with Nina scoring two crucial goals. The defensive unit stood firm, ensuring a well-deserved victory for the team.

The U13 team produced some fantastic performances playing in the ISA Finals. They conceded only one goal in their group game and played brilliantly in the semi-final, only to concede a late



goal against the run of play. The team showed great resilience to bounce back and win their 3rd/4th playoff after a penalty shootout to claim the bronze medals.

It's been a busy term for our ski racers. In September, the Warwick Schools Foundation teams took to the slopes to compete against other Midlands schools in the English Schools Ski Association dry slope qualifiers. Keeping their focus in torrential rain, King's High's racers delivered great results, qualifying for the English Schools Championships alongside successful teams from Warwick School. In October, the teams travelled to Norwich for the Championships weekend at which the U16s, Frankie, Holly, Lydia and Darcey, achieved a fantastic silver podium place and the U19s, Alex, Alya, Carys and Kitty, placed 6th – narrowly missing a podium position in a tough field.

Teams then competed in the English Schools open event on the Sunday, a race for all senior schools' skiers, and the qualifier for the November British Schools Finals. With no age group restrictions, this was 'full gas' racing with the very best English schools' teams competing head-to-head! Both of our teams raced hard in a very tight competition with King's A team placing 6th and King's B team in 8th position, gaining two much coveted places in the British Finals.

British Finals weekend took place in Llandudno where our racers braved the rain and fierce winds brought by storm Bert, which was a challenging experience! King's High's A team of Alex, Kitty, Holly, Alya placed a brilliant 6th out of the 14 teams competing with the B team of Carys, Frankie, Darcey and Lydia reaching a solid 11th place. No mean feat at the highly competitive British Finals! This is a truly fantastic improvement moving up the ranks from 14th in 2022 when our King's High racers first competed in the finals.

As a result of individual performances over the season, a number of Warwick Schools Foundation racers across our schools have been offered places to train in the prestigious English Schools Alpine Squads, an outstanding achievement and a just recognition of the hard work students have put into their sport.

In addition to these successes, our teams raced to success in the September ISA National Indoor Ski Championships at The Snow Centre in Hemel Hempstead with our A team becoming the ISA Girls Team Champions and our B team finishing a close second!

A number of our King's High racers will be heading to the snow to attend race training camps this winter and we look forward to seeing the continued success of our students and all of the Warwick Schools Foundation racers in 2025!

The U14 tennis team also showed their mettle in the LTA National competition, securing a hard-fought win over Lutterworth High School. The first pair won 7-6 in a thrilling tie-break, securing the victory and advancing to the second round in their bid for a place at the regional finals. This excellent result marks a positive start to the season for the team.



Not to be outdone, members of our Badminton academy have been out in force in various cup competitions and tournaments as the sport continues to grow at King's. The Highlight of the season so far came at the ISA U13 and U15 National Finals. Congratulations to Hannah, who was the runner-up in the U17 Cup, facing an opponent who has won the title for the past few years. In the U17 Plate competition, Eva emerged as the winner, with Nirja finishing 3rd. In the U17 Doubles competition, Hannah and Eva were runners-up, and Isabel and El secured 3rd place. In the U15 singles competition, well done to Yannis, who finished 3rd overall, and Georgina who came runners up in the plate final. Everyone played exceptionally well and should be proud of their sportsmanship and teamwork.

Our swimmers have enjoyed many successes in the pool during this first term. The highlight so far, of course, has to be the senior team qualifying in 4th place at the ESSA Team Relay National Finals. An outstanding achievement. To prove this level of performance isn't just reserved for the senior team, all of our swimmers were in action in the pool as we hosted the Warwick

100's and I'm delighted to report that King's retained the overall title, despite tough opposition.

Cross country has had a mixed season so far with exceptional performances at the county round of the ESAA Team Cup. Both the U15 and U13 teams qualified for the Regional round with ease. It wasn't to be on the day as the teams challenged for spots at the National Finals but we are sure they will come back stronger again next term for the new challenges posed of them.

The sporting achievements at King's High School this term reflect the incredible talent and hard work of our students across a wide range of disciplines. From team sports like hockey and netball to individual triumphs in skiing, fencing, and trampolining, our athletes have shown what they are capable of. As the season progresses, we look forward to even more success and growth from all of our teams and individuals, with exciting opportunities ahead in every sport. 

A LEGACY REMEMBERED



Barbara Ansell, a distinguished King's High School Old Girl, was a trailblazer in medicine, particularly in paediatric rheumatology. Born in 1923 in the house now commemorated with a blue plaque commemorating her legacy, she was the only child of Herbert Joseph Ansell and Annie Olivia Chubb, who herself was a

King's High alumna. Barbara began her education at home before joining the school's kindergarten at age seven. Despite living nearby, she became a boarder in 1935 after earning a County Minor Scholarship. Her father, who had been Mayor of Warwick, often travelled for work, which may have influenced this decision.

Barbara thrived under the guidance of headmistress Eleanor Doorly, excelling academically and creatively. She contributed to the school's magazine, held leadership roles in debating and international relations societies, and achieved distinction in Biology while excelling in Physics, Chemistry, and French.

In 1941, during World War II, Barbara won a Queen's Scholarship to study Medicine at the University of Birmingham. Women were still underrepresented in medical schools, but Barbara excelled, achieving a distinction in Surgery in her final exams. Post-graduation, she trained in London before joining Professor Eric Bywaters in 1951, where her groundbreaking work in paediatric rheumatology began. She developed a classification system for childhood arthritis and promoted holistic, multidisciplinary care, setting a global standard.

Barbara advanced research and pioneered surgical interventions for children with joint damage, co-authoring the influential *The Surgical Management of Juvenile Chronic Polyarthritis*. Recognised internationally, she became a Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians, received a CBE in 1982, and was honored by the Royal College of Surgeons in 1985 - a true Changemaker of her time.

In recognition of Barbara's remarkable achievements, the Ansell Laboratory at King's High was named in her honour, ensuring her legacy continues to inspire future generations of Changemakers.
